Access to the Clyde from GRC facilities (via steps) does not afford easy access for formal launches. In line with the Clyde Guidelines, a rescue craft (tub-double) is maintained in readiness at GRC facilities when GRC boats are on the water. GRC has one small craft (rigid inflatable) which can be fitted with an outboard motor. This craft is only suitable for carrying a single person and is not suitable as a main rescue craft. The craft is used for additional head race cover and very occasional coaching sessions. This craft is not part of the day-to-day operational or safety cover at GRC. When deployed on the water this craft does carry a throw rope and space blankets. The craft is only operated by a small number of GRC members with appropriate experience of safe operation and use.
